
MEDICAL STUDENT EDUCATION

EDUCATION

PROGRAM IN BIOETHICS, LAW AND MEDICAL PROFESSIONALISM

The BLMP program continues to advance and pave the way in education, faculty development, and research. Additional students have joined the Medical Ethics and Law Discovery Pathways Track, bringing the total number of track students to 13 to date.

Continuing in education, Professor Allen and Dr. Mosley facilitated an elective course for fourth year medical students titled "Financial, Business, and Health Systems Aspects of Medicine." Professor Allen also facilitated an elective course for fourth year medical students titled "Advanced Issues in Medical Ethics and Law."

Attributing to the outstanding faculty development in CHFM, Dr. Mosley attended the 12th Annual Pediatric Bioethics Conference hosted by the Florida Bioethics Network at Wolfson Children's Hospital in Jacksonville. Professor Solberg also taught an expanded version GMS5905, a career development course that focuses on what it means to be a "research professional," in particular what it means to support conduct of research in a variety of career pathways other than a faculty member.

FACULTY DEVELOPMENT

As part of faculty development and mentoring of junior faculty, our department will again be conducting seminars following several faculty meetings this year. The topics covered include administrative aspects of academic family medicine (presented by Peter Carek, MD, MS), education in a family medicine department (presented by Rob Hatch, MD, MPH), patient care (presented by John Malaty, MD), and scholarly activity (Arch Mainous, III PhD). The sessions will occur from 8 to 9 am and all faculty members are welcomed to attend.

QUALITY IMPROVEMENT


MEASURING PATIENT REPORTED OUTCOMES


The department continues to work diligently to not only meet, but improve the outcomes for patient quality. For Hemoglobin A1C – Poor Control in Diabetes Mellitus, Microalbumin Screening in Diabetic Patients, Rolling 12 Months, Influenza Immunization, Pneumococcal Vaccination and Controlling High Blood pressure, as a department, the numbers continue to hold steady over the past 13 months. Colorectal Cancer Screening continues to be the one measure that the department has room for significant improvement.


As a department, we are at 64% for the past 13 months which was the end of the second quarter. The national benchmarck is 69%. Each clinic has processes in place and dedicated providers and staff to steadily improve this measure. Of the six measures, Community Health and Family Medicine clinics are the clinics with Best Practice percentages for the past 13 months. The Best Practice numbers are compared to all outpatient clinics at UF Health.

REDUCTION OF PATIENT EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT USAGE AND HOSPITAL READMISSIONS

As a department, the Readmission Quotient fell slightly from a high of 16% at the end of Q1 to 15.56% at the end of Q2. October saw the highest readmission rate at 16.71% but declined sharply in November to 13.89%. Clinics and the RN Health Coaches are working diligently to try and schedule close hospital follow up and communication with patients upon discharge. The interdisciplinary inpatient team continues to meet weekly to review patients readmitted to the hospital the previous week.

The Primary Care Innovations Conference (PCI) will be held on March 6, 2020. The conference has been held annually since it began in 2017. Sessions are interactive and centered around the sharing of ideas.
